REMU

Annual General Meeting

The AGM was held on Saturday 16 March. It was a particularly important AGM because it agreed a new constitution as required by the Registrar of Incorporated Societies to ensure that we comply with the new Incorporated Societies Act 2022.

The new Constitution has a new, additional purpose:

advancing participation of all manner of people in music making by providing opportunities for creation, performance and concerts featuring early music, recorders or other styles of music the Society chooses;

This was added to make it clear that REMU is a community music organisation and not one that is primarily commercial or professionally oriented. Nonetheless REMU will continue to support early music and recorder performance - professional or amateur - as we have done in the past.

Other changes to the Constitution include a register of possible conflicts of interest, obligation and rights of members, a complaints and disputes procedure, documenting new members' consent to join REMU, and Officers of REMU meeting the requirements of the Act, for example, not being bankrupt, over the age of 16, nor convicted of a financial crime.

REMU will continue to be managed and organised by the Committee. The Committee now comprises four Officers; 'Officers' as defined by the Act. The Act does not specify roles such as President, Secretary and Treasurer but REMU has included them in the Constitution in general terms such as the Treasure's overseeing the Society's finances.

The Committee include the Officers and up to four ordinary members. 1

Consorts' news

Dulcis Tibia

In 2023 Dulcis Tibia (Tessa Coppard, Katrin Eickhorst, Roger Palmer and Rachel Patrick) performed again at the Wellington Cathedral of St Paul, in their *Thank God it's Friday* (TGIF) series and at St Mark's Lower Hutt in the Hutt City Council's concert series. At the last minute, Dulcis was called in to play at the St Andrew's on The Terrace

Wednesday lunchtime institution. All concerts were received with interest, particularly as the large instruments were used frequently in the programme of Renaissance, Baroque and 20th Century music.

Dulcis is working on its 2024 programme of Bach, Marcello, Marini, Monteverdi and Mozart. Concerts have been scheduled (TBC) in the same three series as last year, as follows:

St Andrew's, 31 July, 12:15pm;

St Paul's TGIF, 4 Oct, 12.45pm; and

St Marks, Lower Hutt, 20 October, 12:15pm.

Three Blind Mice

This new trio comprising Katrin Eickhorst, Roger Palmer and Rachel Patrick formed in

2023 with the intention of performing some of the exciting music from the recorder trio repertoire. Their first concert will be at the

Cathedral of **St Paul, Wellington, on 19 April at 12:45pm**. The group will play two rarely heard works by New Zealand

composer, David Farquhar (*A Folk Song Trio* and *Obsessions*), the recorder trio favourite, New Braun Bag, Hoffmeister's La Gallina, II Cucco, L'Assino Terzetto (The Hen, the Cuckoo and the Donkey), as well as rounds and some of Bach's Goldberg variations.



Jongleurs

Mid 2023, the painful decision was made to disband the Jongleurs consort. This arose from Bernard Wells (our long-time leader) wanting to follow other musical interests, and some dissatisfaction with where we were going and how to get there. Jongleurs were established in the mid 1990s as a tutored consort.

Ron McNulty joined in late 1990s, and remained a member until the end. Bernard was always the leader, but over the years there were many changes of personnel. The following is an incomplete list: Ron McNulty, John Durnsford, Cynthia Growden, Kate Smart, Danica Hetherington, Hamish Nelson, Suzanne Burkhart and Monika Smith. We

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all owe Bernard a big vote of thanks for encouraging our musical interests.

Light winds

Out of the rubble of Jongleurs, Monika and Ron asked John Lister to form a new trio Light Winds. They have met regularly for several months in 2023 and we expect to play at the next REMU Soiree. They are on the lookout for a fourth member, so if you are a competent SATB player and can play one to a part, please contact them.

Mistral

The 11 members of Mistral rehearsed every week throughout 2023. They presented items at all REMU soirees. The consort played magnificently in three rest homes before Xmas, at the Ngaio Community Christmas Service and Christmas Carols at the Railway Station in early December. It was good that Ron Ward from Valley Players joined for those performances. Playing his great bass added a strong tone to all the group's sound.

Many members in the group are now upskilling to play a recorder which they are not familiar with, e.g. bass, tenor and alto, which means all members have a chance to play different lines on any piece.

Mistral will continue to work on the *Lachrimae* series by John Dowland over the year, there will be a review of fun jazzy favourites and a lot of new pieces along the way. 2023 has begun well focusing on Holborne Quintet and some of the Lachrimae pieces.

Rare Byrds

This Dunedin-based group continues to meet regularly for practice sessions in a four-person recorder consort and a six-person mixed consort, the latter currently consisting of two recorders, a spinet, bass viol, nyckelharpa, and the recent addition of a learner lutenist. Their concert schedule hasn't yet recovered from the combined effects of covid and individual health issues within the group, but we have a few gigs pencilled in for 2024, including in Dunedin's historic First Church, where they performed a programme of Holborne's music late last year. Some of them are very much missing regular contact with recorder friends in Wellington, but getting away for extended breaks, or even short ones, can be tricky at the moment. Music they're playing and enjoying at the moment includes Purcell Trio Sonata No 2, Josquin's La Spagna, and pieces from a collection of Czech Renaissance dances that one of their members recently bought home from a work trip to Prague.

SuBreMo Trio

A fairly recent addition to recorder consorts in the Wellington region is the "SuBreMo Trio", where Susanne Burkhart, Brenda Vale and Monika Wells meet fairly regularly to play with or without continuo. The trio is at present working on a new piece by Samuel Berkahn (hot off the press!) which they hope to present at the next REMU soiree.

Valley Players

Over 2023 Valley Players shrank from 5 to three. Helen Willberg found the pressure of her many services to church and music education too much to continue to participate. Fortunately, John Lister was able to make up a trio with Diana Barnes and Ron Ward. Ron has amassed considerable numbers of trios over the years. The consort prepared a Haydn Baryton trio arrangement for the last soiree of the year, but had to replace one player on the day due to covid. They



were very fortunate to have Michelle Greenwood take over the most challenging part.

Valley Players continues to meet weekly on Tuesday Mornings.

Matangi Recorder Hui

The (almost) annual Hui was held in February 2024. We think it was the 9th one. Twelve players from Auckland and around the Waikato met just outside Hamilton for a weekend of music-making, fun, friendship and feasting.

Much of the music and all the conducting was provided by



Simon James, as usual. Thank you Simon! For 4 or 5 hours each day we played an eclectic mix of pieces from 2 choir Palestrina to klezmer on instruments ranging from sopranino to contrabass, and



enjoyed shared lunches in the garden in the shade of a massive copper beech. Saturday

> night dinner with 'significant others' at a Turkish restaurant was followed by dessert at the nearby renowned Duck Island icecream shop. Amazingly, we were sufficiently recovered to continue playing on Sunday morning and well into the afternoon until the Auckland contingent had to head home.

Norvis 2023

Last August we were excited to be in the UK and at Norvis! Norvis is a week-long early music course held at Barnard Castle College. We had wanted to include an early music

course in our UK travel plans and Norvis turned out to be perfect!

Norvis tutors were outstanding and the event was so worthwhile! We were well accommodated and there were plenty of opportunities to get to know other musicians. Norvis has tutored group work each morning (e.g. orchestra, recorder ensemble, choral, lute, viols) and a range of elective 'delights' each afternoon. Jenny chose a recorder technique class and a choral group, and Bob played baroque bassoon with the orchestra. He also had fun playing shawms and other loud things with a group of like-minded musicians!

Norvis participants played in ensemble groups each morning with input from tutors. Our group included Sarah Kirk (REMU's treasurer) on recorder and baroque flute, Elizabeth Brown on spinet and Jonathan Holt on baroque violin. Jonathan visited us when he travelled to NZ in September!

Society of Recorder Players

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Frank Carpay Scholarship

The Society of Recorder Players (New Zealand) is offering a competitive scholarship, from the Frank Carpay Memorial Fund (1917 – 1985; a Dutch-born Auckland industrial designer and potter).

The SRP(NZ) invites organisations, students and suitably qualified or experienced people, in Auckland, to apply for a grant up to \$5,000 for study, research or performance of early music. Applications by anyone who is not resident in Auckland but for support of concerts in Auckland will be considered.

Early music is "music for which a historically appropriate style of performance must be reconstructed on the basis of surviving scores, treatises, instruments and other contemporary evidence" and was composed in the 18th century or earlier.

Applicants are requested to provide a description of how they will use the grant (no more than 500 words), along with a budget (including any other sources income) and biographic (or equivalent) information about the applicant(s). At least one external reference, for example: a letter of support from the research supervisor, or performance teacher, an independent critical performance or recording review, supporting the application is required,

The Society of Recorder Players (New Zealand) decisions on the scholarship and its distribution will be final. The Society may determine that it has not received any applications suitable for the scholarship.

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Other news and information

Where do you get your recorders?

If you want or need a new recorder, what are your options? *Woodenrecorders.co.nz* is the only dedicated recorder dealership, and provides recorders from the workshops of Mollenhauer, Moeck and Kung. They hold a stock of the more commonly sought models, and can get anything from these makers, usually within 3 weeks. They are happy to send out up to 3 recorders at a time on trial, because they know it is important to try before you buy. You can visit to try out more recorders, but only if you fancy a trip to the Far North! www.woodenrecorders.co.nz

An alternative is Orpheus Music (see below) in Australia. They are highly recommended by many NZ players. They hold stock from other makers, as well as a large library of printed music. You can also sign up for a monthly email with news and information, which is often very interesting. https://orpheusmusic.com.au/

Further afield, Lazars and others in the USA, together with the Early Music Shop in the UK and Thomann in Germany, are able to send instruments overseas. These outlets will be able to provide a bigger range, but you can't try out an instrument before buying it, and returns are at your cost.

When buying from overseas, there are also shipping and import costs to take into account. There is no duty on musical instruments, but if the value of the parcel is more than \$1000 GST plus administrative fees will be charged by the Customs service. GST is 15%, and the fee is usually around \$50. The process of getting your parcel through customs can take a week or two.
